



Support for Clinics in Developing a Buprenorphine Treatment Program for Opioid Use Disorder

Introduction

Although many primary care clinicians obtain a waiver from the DEA to prescribe buprenorphine for patients with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD), some clinicians work in settings that do not have clinical support systems in place that facilitate the use of these prescribing privileges.

The <u>Six Building Blocks Program</u>, in collaboration with <u>Public Health – Seattle and King County</u>, developed a resource to guide primary care organizations as they develop the clinic systems needed to support providers who wish to provide the critical service of treating patients with OUD. This resource provides key components that are either required for a health care system when providing buprenorphine treatment for OUD or are considered critical best practices. Buprenorphine treatment for OUD is evolving, and this document's recommendations reflect current thinking about how to support safe and effective medication treatment for OUD as of Spring 2020.
